Welcome

During 2024-25 Worcester City Council will spend £27.8 million providing essential services to you. Our costs are increasing in line with inflation so this year our element of your Council Tax bill will rise by around 1.7p per day in order to help us protect your services. You can find out how much you'll pay on page five.

Worcester City Council collects the Council Tax on behalf of Worcestershire County Council, the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for West Mercia, Hereford & Worcester Fire and Rescue Authority and, depending on where you live, your local parish council. The total amount is then split to provide the services that are part of your everyday life.


This year, the majority of Band D households in Worcester will pay £2,126.72 to their local authorities -that's just £40.90 a week.



The best way to pay

Make your life easier and pay your bill by Direct Debit – it can save you money, time and effort.

Over 75% of households in Worcester already pay this way – all you need to do is give us your bank account details, choose your monthly payment date (it can be the 1st, 10th, 15th or 25th) and we can do the rest.

Improving your city and supporting you

This year Worcester City Council will use its £12.7 million net budget to deliver improvements to your city and provide support when you need it.

For the third year in a row, you told us in our annual survey that your top priority is enhancing and sustaining our beautiful city for future generations.

Our spending plans reflect this result.

In addition, the City Council will progress plans for the improvement of the northern quarter of the city centre, including the regeneration of the Scala arts venue, with a £10 million contribution from the Future High Streets Fund.

The City Council's share of the total Band D Council Tax is £213.08; this is a £6.19 rise on the previous year, but the increase is lower for the majority of city households.

Your Council Tax bill also includes charges for Worcestershire County Council, the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for West Mercia, and Hereford & Worcester Fire and Rescue Authority.



Payment by cash only at your local PayPoint store. You'll need the barcode on your Council Tax bill for reference. No charge for payments; £200 limit per transaction.

We also have a capital programme and continue to invest in what you have told us is important:

A total of **£34m** to improve roads and **£6m** to improve pavements this year.







£78.8m on improving and building new schools including Foxlydiate in Redditch.

£20.2m on

walking and cycling improvements include Hampton and Kepax bridges.





£53m on cutting congestion and infrastructure improvements including A38 in Bromsgrove.



£17.3m to improve rail station facilities.

£4.6m to continue with our street light improvement programme.





I know the last year has been a difficult one for many. The Council has faced similar challenges too from the impact of inflation on costs and increasing demand for services which have added significantly to our budget pressures.

With more vulnerable people needing our support, and with the cost of this care increasing significantly, we have needed to increase our budget this year to ensure we can continue to provide these essential services.

The Government is providing additional funding and we are reforming the way we work to deliver savings and efficiencies. However, this is not enough to meet the budget pressures and therefore we need to increase Council Tax to be able to adequately fund these services.

Our Council Tax will though remain one of the lowest of any comparable County Council in the country.

The additional funding will mean we can continue to deliver vital children's and adult social care to protect the most vulnerable in our society, on which we now spend over 70% of our revenue budget.

It will also enable us to maintain our commitments to invest in the priorities that you have told us are most important. These include better roads and pavements, tackling congestion and improving public transport alongside investments in the economy, environment and extra school places.
